# Ligonier eyes growth on city's south side

Mayor Patty Fisel's top priority for commercial expansion on a portion of 117 acres of land recently annexed and rezoned is attracting a hotel to Ligonier. The Coussens Ligonier Planned Development received the city's approval recently and includes 52 acres zoned for industry, 50 acres for residential growth, and about 15 acres zoned for commercial business growth. Ligonier no longer has a hotel, causing visitors to seek out overnight accommodations elsewhere in Noble County or nearby Goshen. Fisel hopes to see a hotel

with about 30 beds. She also sees a need for another grocery store in the city, perhaps a discount chain like Aldi, and more fast food restaurants as a good fit.

#### \$2M for PreservINg Main Street

#### Kendallville named a Pilot Community

Kendallville has been selected to receive \$2 million to transform historic buildings along Main Street. The Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs made the announcement on September 10 following a presentation made and attended by stakeholders from across the county at the Strand Theatre in August.

Brookville, Indiana was also named a pilot community, a decision that doubled the amount of funding originally announced. According to Mayor SuzAnne Handshoe, Kendallville plans to use the money to work towards renovating one or more "demonstration blocks" to serve as a model for historic preservation renovation and to help build capacity and resources to keep the momentum going. Other projects could include the development of a cultural, historic "trail" and programming for building owners. Experience the Heart of Kendallville (EHK), the lead organization, is seeking to raise the \$200,000 required funding match. The organization's website offers a way to donate and follow the project.



# Foundation investing in children

As the Community Foundation of Noble County celebrates its 30th anniversary, it is committed to identifying and responding to emerging local issues and helping the region prepare for the future. One such issue identified is access to high quality, affordable child care and early learning opportunities. The Foundation has partnered with the Noble County EDC and Crossroads United Way to execute a strategy to address this need. An early childhood coalition has been formed and, soon, a full-time coordinator will be onboarded. In addition, the Foundation has awarded six grants to local organizations in recognition of their work in child care and early learning, as well as youth entrepreneurship.

#### Noble companies receive grants

Two Noble County manufacturers are recipients of Manufacturing Readiness Grants in the fourth round of investments by the Indiana Economic Development Corporation in partnership with Conexus Indiana. Kammerer Dynamics Inc. and Reliable Tool & Machine Co. will receive \$65,000 and \$10,000 respectively in support of technology-based capital investments. The companies are among a total of 34 across the state to be awarded funding this round.

### Commissions award facade grants

The Kendallville Redevelopment Commission recently approved a facade grant to reimburse 50% of the costs of improvements planned for The Breakfast House on South Main Street. Roofing, siding, new doors, and other updates will cost an estimated \$26,279. The Albion Redevelopment Commission also approved a funding



match for updates at Albion Pizza Depot. Those improvements are expected to cost about \$19,954 and will include roofing, new doors, and paint. In Ligonier, the Redevelopment Commission approved gutter replacements for the Ligonier Visitors Center. The city agreed to pay up to \$5,207 through a facade grant for upgrades.





#### Students expand their impact

Local high school students enrolled in the Impact Institute Building Trades program are honing their skills and sharing time and talents again in Noble County. This time, students are working on a one-story home for a single mom and her two sons. The build, taking place on Newnam Avenue in Kendallville, is a project of Habitat for Humanity of Northeast Indiana. Students at Impact also played a significant role in home renovation projects of Kendallville Restorations Inc. (KRI), a local non-profit organization working to eliminate blight and provide affordable single-family housing. Such collaborations are significant as Noble County continues to be challenged by a lack of housing needed to grow the workforce.

# **Boost Noble County's case for broadband**

Noble County is leading the state in the number of locations that have recorded speed tests, and all those who experience slow or intermittent internet connectivity in rural Noble County are encouraged to participate. The Indiana Speed Test takes less than one minute to complete using any internet connected device and does not collect any personal information. The data derived, however, may prove critical for Noble County ISPs competing for funding to expand fiber optic networks.


