

Cromwell will upgrade water treatment plant

The Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA) has awarded a \$700,000 grant to the Town of Cromwell to upgrade the town's water treatment plant. Design work is already underway to rehabilitate a water tower put up in 1974, replace fire hydrants, and install new water meters for users of the town's utility. Construction is expected to take up to 18 months and will likely begin mid-summer. Cromwell will also see a significant upgrade with the replacement of a culvert on SR 5 at the railroad tracks, relocating electrical, water, and sewer utilities.

Local dog owners will be excited to learn Restore Avilla, a local non-profit organization that focuses on economic development in Avilla, has reached its fundraising goal of \$38,000 and will construct a new dog park. The county's first dog park will be called **Crump's Canine Corral**, named in honor of Vinnie and Camille Crump, top donors to the project. Organizers hope the park, to be located near the Avilla branch of the Noble County Public Library on Ley Street in Avilla, will be completed this spring.

Dollar General opened a new store near the intersection of SR 9 north and US 6 between Ligonier and Kendallville recently. The addition of the Rome City-area store opens opportunities for nonprofit organizations, libraries, and schools within a 15-mile radius of the new location, to apply for Dollar General Literacy Foundation grants. The company typically hires six to 10 employees at each store.
