Be Noble's annual meeting held

A call to action to support entrepreneurs

Over 70 people attended the annual meeting of Be Noble Inc., Noble County's local economic development organization, on August 27. They gathered to enjoy breakfast in the historic Strand Theatre in downtown Kendallville and to hear local updates and keynote speaker Julie Heath, VP of Entrepreneurial Ecosystems for the Indiana Economic Development Corporation.



Before Heath took to the podium, Mayor SuzAnne Handshoe, President of Be Noble's board of directors, provided brief updates in each of the organization's strategic work areas, which included business retention and expansion, development sites, talent development, housing, child care, and entrepreneurial support. Handshoe was followed by Tom Leedy, a member of Be Noble's board of directors and Thrive Noble County steering committee, who shared data to illustrate the impact and opportunities presented by entrepreneurs and small businesses in Noble County. Be Noble executive director Gary Gatman ended the one-hour program by sharing a "blueprint" for the development of an entrepreneurial ecosystem in Noble County.

Gatman noted that just one year ago, at the 2021 annual meeting, the audience was left with a call to action to develop an Industry 4.0 training initiative. That message catalyzed the iSMART Lab that will welcome its first learners this fall at the Community Learning Center. Gatman hopes that entrepreneurship will garner the same kind of enthusiasm and collaboration in the year ahead.

Avilla eyes building for co-working space

Members of Avilla's Redevelopment Commission began discussions around the idea of purchasing a vacant building in downtown Avilla to open up a co-working space. Co-working spaces are popping up all across the county to serve remote workers and others who desire an environment where they can interact with others and enjoy resources like video-conference rooms, office equipment, a physical "work" address, and access to mentors, among other amenities not as easily accessible when working from home. The building under consideration is on Albion Street, adjacent to the town's pocket park, making it an ideal location to help attract and grow local small business ventures.

Next steps outlined for PMS grant

The City of Kendallville was awarded a \$2 million grant from the state Office of Community and Rural Affairs in late 2021 to improve downtown. Now, officials say the city is ready to submit its project for approval. In total, 10 buildings are on the roster for facade improvements through the grant.

Locations that stand to be transformed through new windows, brick repairs, cleaning and repainting storefronts, and restoring and/or preserving historic features, include 100 Main, Strand Theatre, Love Me 2 Times on Main, Hosler Realty, Kendallville Auto Parts, Jeny's Tacos, Kropp Insurance, Treehouse Realty, and the former Relaxation Station. Leaders hope to receive approval for the project by the end of August after which bids will be sought. The city hopes the bidding process will begin in October.

Parkview Noble a 100 Top Hospital

Fourth time in five years

Parkview Noble Hospital has again been recognized as one of the top 20 Small Community Hospitals in the nation. Although the list calls out the "100 Top" hospitals in the U.S., only 20 Small Community Hospitals (out of an estimated 850 nationwide) are recognized each year for exceptional performance across a variety of categories. Small Community Hospitals are those with 25 to 99 beds.

Campaign promoted local jobs

County employers looking to fill jobs that pay at least \$15 an hour. The ad was seen 9,988 times and reached 4,359 people. 224 of those people clicked on or "liked" the ad and 17 added a personal reaction. 10 users shared the ad. 85 users clicked through to visit the WorkNoble.org website.

Of the 9,988 people who saw the ad, 64% identified as female and 36% male. They represented an even distribution of ages from 25 to 64 years. The campaign was targeted only to Facebook users in Noble County's communities. Employers with eligible jobs are

YMCA looks at child care in Ligonier

Three community conversations moderated by staff from the Cole Center YMCA were held recently in Ligonier in an effort to gather information and identify barriers to accessing early childhood education and care.

Many parents said a lack of daycare options meant they had to stay home instead of working, yet Ligonier employers, many of which continue to seek workers, were noticeably absent from the series of community conversations. Other barriers noted by participants were transportation, because working parents may not leave work to pick up their children from a local half-day preschool program, and affordability. Parents cited the need to weigh the costs of childcare against potential earnings.

Casey Weimer, chief executive officer at the Cole Center YMCA, said the goal the organization has is to open a preschool program in Ligonier by the 2023-24 school year. The YMCA is already investing in staff training at their Central Noble program in order to have staff ready to move to a program in Ligonier.
