# Making headway in Ligonier

Efforts to expand the capacity and quality of child care in Noble County are moving forward at a rapid pace in western Noble County. In recent weeks, Thrive by 5 has collaborated with multiple partners to move the needle on one of the top challenges for employers and working parents in the region.



Leaders in Ligonier are making plans after Thrive by 5 coordinator Jenna Anderson, Mayor Earle Franklin, and public safety director Bryan Shearer made the case at a December 18 meeting in the city. On January 8, West Noble School district officials expressed their willingness to take part in future discussions, citing many potential benefits to the community. Ligonier City Council also agreed to apply for a \$500,000 Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs grant in the second half of this year.

Just two days later, the Ligonier Redevelopment Commission expressed support of a proposal to bring a 50-seat child care center to the community, approving a request to work with financial consultant Baker Tilly to determine if tax incremental financing (TIF) funds could be dedicated to the project.

A Lilly Endowment Gift VIII grant of \$315,000 is transferable, awarded to Thrive by 5 for an Albion project that stalled, to support the Ligonier project. To learn more or add to this effort, contact Anderson at (260) 894-3335.

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# **Exclusive grant for Noble workers opens**

The **Workplace Preparedness Grant** has been announced by Be Noble Inc. in partnership with the Community Foundation of Noble County. The application deadline is February 16, 2024.

The Workplace Preparedness Grant is targeted to help workers who have prospective or secured employment in Noble County and are enrolled in a program to earn, or who have recently earned, a workforce certification, Associates Degree, or Bachelor Degree. Eligible workers may receive up to \$1,000 for the exclusive purpose of acquiring tools, equipment or other supplies needed in their occupation, but not provided by their employer or prospective employer.

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## Dollar General fills a gap

In 2002, Kendallville residents south of downtown lost a staple in their community, the Big Blue Market. The small, neighborhood market that opened in 1954 as South Side Market closed it's doors and left that part of the city in a "food desert." A brand new Dollar General store that recently opened about 2.5 blocks north of where Big Blue once was has helped fill that void.

Following the demolition of the former Nightmare on Main, Dollar General has opened a larger store that aims to compete with bigger grocery stores by offering fresh produce and other food selections. ## iSMART Lab to expand

The Community Learning Center (CLC) was recently presented a check from the Northeast Indiana Regional Development Authority for the purchase of Phase II equipment for its iSMART Lab, an Industry 4.0 learning lab that was launched in 2022.

The iSMART Lab at the CLC enables teens and adults to learn the skills needed for occupations in high demand across Northeast Indiana. The grant for \$198,450 was awarded through Indiana's READI program.

With construction underway on the 1915 section of the CLC, plans include the expansion of the lab in order to add new, smart factory simulation modules. These enhancements will bring more advanced skills training opportunities under programs offered by Freedom Academy and Impact Institute. ## Noble kids eligible for free books


Any child newborn to age five living in Noble County can now be enrolled to receive a free book every month. The Dolly Parton Imagination Library is now available locally, made possible by Crossroads United Way (CUW) serving Elkhart, LaGrange and Noble counties.

After enrollment, the first book will arrive in six to eight weeks, then one each month will be shipped through the child's fifth year. There are no costs, income limitations, or other requirements. Questions can be directed to CUW at (574) 295-1690.

## Rezoning approved for new school

Noble County Commissioners recently approved a request to rezone three acres on the west side of Noble County to make way for a new school to service Amish members of the community. Since the 1960s, according to a report in the News Sun, Amish schools, which typically serve students through eighth grade, are limited to 50 pupils. This means as demand grows, more schools must be constructed. In Noble County, the number of schools to serve Amish residents is growing. There are currently nine in operation, with two more pending.





## Noble teens invited to Youth Business Fair

Bob Amber, Albion Fire Chief, was surprised to receive a State Fire Marshal's Heroic Life Saving Award recently. On December 15, Amber was on his way home when he saw smoke. Upon closer inspection, he saw the smoke was rising from both sides of a home in the 1000 block of East Seneca Street in Albion - and spotted a car in the drive with a handicap sticker on it. After reporting the emergency to get fire trucks rolling, Amber geared up and entered the home, saving the life of a 62-year-old resident who was suffering from smoke inhalation and thermal injuries. The resident, later flown by helicopter for specialized care, has since been released from the hospital and is recovering in a local care facility.

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
